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Report Summary

As part of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) relicensing process, Yadkin was asked by the Recreation, Aesthetics, and Shoreline Management Issue Advisory Group to 1) inventory recreational opportunities and facilities at the Project's public access recreation areas, 2) describe the condition of the facilities, 3) assess opportunities for barrier-free access and 4) evaluate effects of reservoir fluctuations on the availability of recreational facilities.

The public access recreation areas inventoried as part of this study provide opportunities for motorized and non-motorized boating, bank and pier fishing, camping, swimming, picnicking, and hiking. Currently, there are 40 major public recreation areas (excluding recreation areas considered "closed") that provide direct access to Yadkin Project lands and/or waters. These recreation areas are located in Davie, Davidson, Rowan, Montgomery, and Stanly counties (see table below). Yadkin, the U.S. Forest Service (USFS), and the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission (NCWRC) work independently and cooperatively to provide and maintain boat launches, courtesy docks, fishing piers, beaches and swimming areas, campsites, and hiking trails at the Project.

Summary of Existing Major Recreational Facilities by County

With 26 boat ramps, 15 boat docks, and 40 bank fishing areas, boating and fishing facilities are well-dispersed. Generally, the ramps and docks are distributed evenly around the Project with Davidson, Montgomery, Rowan, and Stanly having 7, 7, 5, and 6 boat ramps respectively. Similarly, picnic areas (14 total) are also well-dispersed among the four counties. Fishing piers are available in Montgomery and Stanly counties, swim areas are available in Davidson and Stanly counties, and campgrounds are available in Montgomery County.

Dispersed recreation, primarily fishing and camping, is prevalent around the Project reservoirs. The prevalence of dispersed recreation suggests that not all recreation demands are being met by the existing recreation areas: primarily camping. Currently, there are only three public campgrounds adjacent to the Project reservoirs and they are all within the Uwharrie National Forest. With the exception of High Rock Marina and Campground (private), there are no other overnight camping facilities on High Rock, Tuckertown, and Falls reservoirs. ¹

¹ There are longer-term (weekly and monthly) camping opportunities on these reservoirs.

The operation of High Rock and Narrows reservoirs may affect the availability of recreational facilities on these reservoirs. During the summer months, because both reservoirs are generally operated within 3-5 feet of normal full pool, all boat ramps and facilities on High Rock and Narrows reservoirs remain usable. However, when High Rock Reservoir is drawdown (e.g. seasonally, for maintenance, etc.), some facilities may become unusable. Specifically, the boat ramps at the Southmont Boat Access Area, the Buddle Creek Boat Access Area, the Dutch Second Creek Boat Access, and the Flat Swamp Boat Access may be affected by a drawdown. All boat ramp facilities on Narrows are generally unaffected by normal reservoir operation, but may become affected during periods of low inflow.

Generally, the facilities at the Yadkin, USFS, and NCWRC recreation areas are well maintained and in good condition. Each year Yadkin spends approximately \$500,000 to provide recreational opportunities for the public, Activities include access area maintenance, signage, security, trash/waste collection and disposal. Recent improvements have been made at several of the recreation areas. Additionally, there are existing plans to improve and/or upgrade the facilities at some of the recreation areas. While the recreation facilities are generally in good condition, there are a few facilities that are in need of repair or replacement. Specifically, there are boat ramps in need of repair or maintenance. Additionally, there are instances of vandalism to trash receptacles, signs, picnic tables, and portable toilets. Also, there are parking areas and access roads where the surfacing has deteriorated. To improve safety at these recreation areas, Yadkin recently updated its Public Safety Plan (December 2003). Yadkin also provides safety and rescue equipment, posts bi-lingual signs (English and Spanish), and funding for additional county patrols at the swim areas.

A disabled access assessment was made at each public access recreation area. A "barrier-free" facility is a facility where access is free of impediments to safe use and passage to persons with disabilities or handicaps. Any barrier-free facility, such as a boat ramp, courtesy dock, fishing pier, or a picnic area should be designed so that it can be approached, entered, and used by people with disabilities. Factors considered in conducting the disabled access assessment at each recreation area included: the availability of signed handicapped parking; the surface and slope of accessible pathways; access to boat transfer facilities (courtesy docks); the design of existing fishing piers; the accessibility to side or end-approach picnic tables; and the availability of barrier-free restroom facilities at each recreation area.

Although limited, barrier-free opportunities do exist at the Project. The Circle Drive Boat Access Area, managed by the NCWRC, is a good example of barrier-free boating facilities. The area has a designated and signed handicapped parking space, which is along an accessible pathway (concrete) that leads to accessible boat ramps and courtesy docks.

Several access areas, such as the Highway 49 Boat Access Area on Narrows Reservoir (Badin Lake), are designed to be barrier-free, but lack some necessary elements. The courtesy boat docks at the Highway 49 Boat Access Areas were constructed to be barrier-free, but there is currently no signed handicapped parking space or accessible pathway to the facilities. In most cases, the absence of an accessible pathway and/or a designated parking space are the only remaining improvements required to make facilities barrier-free.

1 Introduction

Alcoa Power Generating Inc. (APGI) is the licensee for the Yadkin Hydroelectric Project (Yadkin Project or Project). The Yadkin Project is managed and operated by APGI's Yadkin Division and is currently licensed by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) as Project No. 2197. This license expires in 2008 and APGI must file a new license application with FERC on or before April 30, 2006.

As part of the relicensing process, APGI prepared and distributed, in September 2002, an Initial Consultation Document (ICD), which provides a general overview of the Project. Agencies, municipalities, non-governmental organizations and members of the public were given an opportunity to review the ICD and identify information and studies that were needed to address relicensing issues. To assist in the identification of issues and data or study needs, APGI formed several Issue Advisory Groups (IAGs) to advise APGI on resource issues throughout the relicensing process. IAGs have had the opportunity to review and comment on Draft Study Plans. The study plan for this study was finalized after receiving input from the Recreation, Aesthetics and Shoreline Management (RASM) IAG in October 2003. A Draft Study Report was distributed to the RASM IAG in October 2004 for their review and comment. Subsequent to this, APGI met with the IAG on November 3, 2004 to review and discuss the report. In addition to the comments received at this meeting, APGI received written comments on the Draft Report (see Appendix C). The Draft Report was then revised to reflect the comments received and finalized.

1.1 Background Information

In January 2003 relicensing participants identified two issues and study requests specific to this study:

These study requests were initially discussed with the RASM IAG at a March 13, 2003 meeting. A preliminary scope of work (dated July 2003) was discussed at the RASM IAG meeting held on July 9, 2003 and a Draft Study Plan was distributed for review and comment in August 2003. On October 8, 2003, Yadkin met with the RASM IAG to discuss comments received on the Draft Study Plan. The study plan was revised based on comments received and finalized in October 2003 (see Appendix A).

1.2 Project Area

The Yadkin Project is a hydroelectric project consisting of four reservoirs, dams, and powerhouses located on the Yadkin River in central North Carolina (see Figure 1-1). The four reservoirs fall within a 38-mile stretch of the Yadkin River (mile 272 to mile 234) and encompass a drainage area of 4,190 square miles. High Rock Dam is at river mile 253 and the reservoir, the largest of the four reservoirs, has a water surface area of 15,180 acres with 360 miles of shoreline. Tuckertown Dam is located at river mile 244 and Tuckertown Reservoir has of 2,560 acres of surface area with 75 shoreline miles. Narrows Reservoir (Badin Lake) covers an area of 5,353 acres with 115 miles of shoreline and Falls Reservoir, the smallest of the four reservoirs, covers 204 acres with six shoreline miles. Narrows Dam is located at river mile 236.5 and Falls Dam is at mile 234.

The Yadkin River basin has a drainage area of 4,190 square miles above Falls Dam. The drainage basin is located primarily in the northern piedmont of North Carolina, with a small portion extending into southern Virginia. Within the basin, land use is approximately 51% forested, 30% agricultural, 11% urban, and 2% federal. Included in these federal lands is the Uwharrie National Forest (UNF) which is located in close proximity to Narrows and Falls reservoirs on their eastern shorelines. The Yadkin River rises in the Appalachian Mountains in North Carolina and picks up additional tributaries as it flows in a northeasterly direction. Northwest of Winston Salem, the river turns south through flatter terrain to High Rock Dam. Upstream of High Rock Dam, the South Yadkin River joins the Yadkin near Salisbury in Rowan County. Just south of Falls Dam, the river becomes the Pee Dee River at its confluence with the Uwharrie River. Also located immediately downstream of the Falls Development on the Pee Dee are the Tillery and Blewett Falls impoundments operated by Progress Energy. The Pee Dee River continues a southeastern flow to Winyah Bay in South Carolina where the river meets the Atlantic Ocean. The larger Yadkin-Pee Dee River basin encompasses 7,213 square miles of drainage area.

Generally, the Project boundary follows the normal full-pool elevation of High Rock, Tuckertown, Narrows and Falls Reservoirs: 623.9-ft, 564.7-ft, 509.8-ft, and 332.8-ft (USGS Datum) respectively. The upstream Project boundary begins on the Yadkin River approximately two miles above Boone's Cave Park and continues downstream to approximately 330 feet below Falls Dam.

1.3 Description of Recreational Opportunities

Yadkin Project recreation areas provide opportunities for motorized and non-motorized boating, bank and pier fishing, swimming, camping, picnicking, and hiking. Recreational facilities available at the recreation areas generally include boat launching ramps, boat docks, fishing piers, swimming areas, picnic areas, campgrounds, and canoe portage trails. Table 1

provides a listing of the recreation areas included in this inventory. ¹ Each of the recreation areas listed in Table 1 will be described in greater detail in Section 5.

Recently, APGI has begun discouraging use at several of the pull-off fishing areas because of the potentially unsafe vehicular/pedestrian interactions. Three of the sites listed in Table 1 are sites at which use has been discouraged: Crane Creek Fishing Access Pull-off, Abbotts Creek/NC 8 Bridge Pull-off, and Lick Creek Fishing Pull-off.


In addition to the recreation areas listed in Table 1, this inventory identifies 41 dispersed recreation areas (total) on all four reservoirs. Generally, these dispersed recreation areas are used for bank fishing and camping (see Section 5.3).


¹ "Dispersed recreation areas" are not formal recreation areas. Rather, these areas are places along the reservoir shorelines that are popular for fishing and camping.




















1.4 Current Project Operations

Based on the availability of water, the Project developments are operated during peak periods (weekdays). High Rock is the uppermost and largest of the four reservoirs and is operated as a storage reservoir on a seasonal basis. High Rock is operated according to operating guides. Under these guides, the reservoir water levels are maintained at a higher level from May 15 – September 15 and are then drawn down during the fall and winter. Typically, the drawdown at High Rock is between 12 and 15 feet. Tuckertown Reservoir has limited storage capacity and is operated with a daily pondage and a normal fluctuation of 0 to 3 feet. Similar to High Rock, Narrows Reservoir (Badin Lake) has storage capabilities and a maximum drawdown capacity of 30 feet. However, Narrows is generally operated with fluctuation within a 3 feet range with that range only being exceeded in periods of very low inflow. Like Tuckertown Reservoir, Falls Reservoir has very limited storage capacity and is operated with a daily pondage and a normal fluctuation of 0 to 3 feet.

2 Need for Study

Under FERC regulations, hydropower licensees have a responsibility to provide reasonable public access to project lands and waters. Yadkin's current license sets forth its obligations for accommodating public recreation at the Project. Generally, the study results will address the adequacy of existing recreational opportunities, facilities, and access to accommodate current use and future demand. Additionally, the study results will help Yadkin make decisions regarding management, planning, design, and construction of recreation facilities at the Project.

3 Study Objectives

As outlined in the Final Study Plan (October 2003), the primary objective of this study is to fully inventory existing public recreation areas that provide direct access to Yadkin Project lands and/or waters. More specifically, the study aims to:

- 1. Describe the available recreation facilities
- 2. Detail the condition of the available recreation facilities
- 3. Identify any operational, maintenance, or safety issues at each recreation area
- 4. Assess the present adequacies and future accessibility needs for people with disabilities

The conclusions of this study are based solely on the information presented herein. However, this report is intended to be used alone and in combination with other information collected during the Recreation Use Assessment to evaluate the adequacy of existing Project public recreation areas to accommodate current use and future demand.

4 Study Methodology

4.1 Develop Inventory and Condition Forms

Three inventory forms were used to inventory the public access recreation areas: a Facilities Inventory and Condition Form, a Recreation Facility Disabled Access Assessment, and a USFS Recreation Site Inventory Form. The Facilities Inventory and Condition Form and the Recreation Facility Disabled Access Assessment were developed during the study planning process and were included in the Final Study Plan. The Facilities Inventory and Condition Form was used during field investigations to inventory each public recreation area. In addition to the Facilities Inventory and Condition Form, the Recreation Facility Disabled Access Assessment was used to evaluate the accessibility of each of the facilities at each public recreation area. A USFS Recreation Site Inventory Form was obtained from the USFS and was used to inventory three Uwharrie National Forest (UNF) campgrounds according to the standards used by the USFS. The three inventory forms have been included in Appendix B.

4.2 Facility Inventory, Condition and Disabled Access Assessment

Using the inventory forms discussed above, each access area was visited and inventoried one or more times from August 26, 2003 to May 5, 2004. Using the Facilities Inventory and Condition Form, each facility at every public recreation area was inventoried in terms of a description of the facilities and their dimensions, capacity, and condition¹. Because most of the recreation areas were visited only once, the inventory and condition assessment of the facilities is reflective of the observed characteristics on the specific day that each area was inventoried. As such, much of the information collected represents a "snapshot in time."

The types of facilities inventoried included boating ramps and docks and fishing piers, campsites, day use/picnic tables and pavillions, swimming areas and beaches, pedestrian and vehicular access facilities, sanitary facilities, and utilities. The condition of each facility was rated using the following criteria:

¹ Facilities that are described as "unimproved" facilities are facilities that generally do not have hardened surfaces but have become available through repeated individual use. Such facilities are also described as "dirt" facilities (i.e. a "dirt launch ramp"). Improved facilities or facilities that have been constructed are usually referred to by their respective surfaces (generally concrete or gravel).

Yadkin Hydroelectric Project (FERC No. 2197) Final Study Report For facilities that were not given a good (G) rating, an explanation of the rating is provided.

The inventory of public recreation areas within the Uwharrie National Forest were conducted with USFS staff, which provided guidance on USFS standards for recreation facilities. For campgrounds in the UNF, the Forest Service's Recreation Site Inventory Form was used to inventory the site and assess the condition of the available facilities. Generally, the U.S. Forest Service provides recreational opportunities and maintains Uwharrie National Forest recreational facilities according to USFS design requirements and accessibility standards. The USFS uses a system known as "Meaningful Measures" to inventory infrastructure, establish standards of quality, estimate costs, and prioritize work at its recreation areas. The USFS also focuses on experience-based management where the focus is the customer and his/her experience and providing a quality experience. Recreation areas in the UNF were inventoried with USFS staff to ensure that condition assessments were made in accordance with USFS standards.

During the condition assessment, the availability of the recreation facilities at varying reservoir elevations was also evaluated. Specifically, in 2003, Yadkin staff measured the water depths at the end of all boat ramps from normal full pool elevation. Field investigations were conducted during the December 2003 drawdown at Narrows Reservoir and existing information from the 2002 drought was also used in the assessment of facility availability at varying water levels. In accordance with a general policy of the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission (NCWRC. p. communication Dean Barbee), a three foot water depth at the end of a boat ramp is considered sufficient for motorized boat launching. This same reasoning was used in this Study Report when evaluating the availability of boat ramps at varying water levels.

Using the Recreation Facility Disabled Access Assessment Form, each facility was also evaluated for handicapped accessibility. Accessibility was determined using guidelines set by the United States Access Board under the provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Specifically, the Access Board's guidelines for "Accessible Boating Facilities" (June 2003) and "Accessible Fishing Piers and Platforms" (June 2003) were used to determine whether facilities were barrier-free. Generally, facilities were evaluated by assessing characteristics such as surfacing, accessible routes to facilities, dimensions of facilities, and any impediments to access.

Additionally, interviews were conducted with APGI, the USFS, and the NCWRC to better understand recent, ongoing, and planned facility improvements, maintenance programs, and any operational or functional issues associated with the recreation areas and facilities.

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¹ The U.S. Access Board recently released updated ADA guidelines on July 23, 2004.

4.3 Recreation Area and Facility Mapping and Photography

The recreation areas and facilities were also documented visually by photograph and mapping. Major facilities at each recreation area were recorded by photo-documentation. Additionally, sites were sketched and measured by hand and geo-referenced using GPS. This information was used to develop a drawing of each public recreation area using Computer Aided Design (CAD).

5 Study Results

5.1 Public Recreation Areas Inventory and Condition Assessment

Generally, Yadkin manages the recreational facilities at the Yadkin Project responsibly to provide safe, clean, attractive, and accessible recreational facilities. Historically, Yadkin has worked cooperatively with federal, state, and local resource agencies to maintain existing recreational facilities to ensure safe public access, enhance existing recreational facilities or construct new facilities to meet regional recreation demand or to provide additional recreational opportunities, and to redesign and operate recreational facilities so they are barrier-free and accessible by persons with disabilities, where appropriate.

What follows is a description of the public access recreation areas and facilities available at each of the Project's four developments. Each inventory provides general information about the area, such as name and location, owner and operator, types of activities, availability of facilities at varying water levels, age of facilities, plans for upgrades or new facilities, site regulations, and operations, maintenance, and safety issues. Specific information for each area includes a completed inventory form, photographs, and CAD drawing.

5.1.1 High Rock Reservoir

There are 10 public recreation areas and four commercial recreation areas (see Section 5.2) located on High Rock Reservoir that provide direct access to the reservoir. The recreation areas on High Rock Reservoir are listed in Table 2.

There are major recreation facilities at seven of these public recreation areas (not including commercial sites) with three areas having no major facilities. Highway 47 Fishing Pull-off, Little Crane Creek Fishing Access, and the High Rock Dam Canoe Portage are the three recreation sites without major facilities. Crane Creek Fishing Pull-off, and Abbotts Creek/NC 8 Bridge Pull-off have historically been reported in FERC Form 80 Reports, but are currently considered "closed" and are not listed as "major facilities." Boat launch ramps (does not include unimproved, dirt ramps), boat docks, fishing piers, swim areas, campgrounds, and picnic areas are all considered major recreation facilities. On High Rock Reservoir, there are 8 boat ramps, 4 boat docks, 2 swim areas, and 4 picnic areas. Of these major recreation facilities on High Rock,

2 boat ramps and 1 boat dock are located in Rowan County and 1 boat ramp is located in Davie County. The remaining 5 boat ramps, 3 boat docks, 2 swim areas, and 4 picnic areas are located in Davidson County. See Table 2.







5.1.1.9 Abbotts Creek/NC Highway 8 Bridge Pull-off

The Abbotts Creek Pull-off is located at the intersection of the Highway 8 Bridge and the Abbotts Creek arm of High Rock Reservoir in Davidson County. This site was inventoried on February 16, 2004. The Abbotts Creek Pull-off is simply an informal bank fishing area along the shoreline paralleling the Highway and the railroad tracks. The underbrush is overgrown along the shoreline with numerous spots cleared out for bank fishing. 





5.1.1.12 High Rock Dam Canoe Portage

The High Rock Dam Canoe Portage Trail is located on the west side (Rowan County) of the dam. From the takeout, the trail ascends a path that is steep, wide, slightly rocky, and covered with leaf litter. Approaching the dam, the trail levels off (nice, wide, even terrain). The trail then follows gravel dam access road for about 100 feet. At the dam, the trail descends a rocky path and then ascends a stone set of stairs. At the top of the stairs, the trail continues on a moderate descent on slightly rocky path with many exposed roots, but the trail is wide and wellworn. The trail continues a moderate descent down to fishing tailrace fishing access. The put-in is a nice beach. The trail is clearly marked throughout by orange blazes. At the time of the visit, there were no noticeable maintenance issues; the trail was generally in good condition with the exception of some uneven footing. It should be noted that conditions may change during the growing season. Total trail distance is about one-third to half of a mile.

5.1.1.13 Yadkin-Pee Dee River Canoe Trail

The Yadkin-Pee Dee River Canoe Trail is a 230-mile river trail on the Yadkin and Pee-Dee Rivers from Wilkesboro, North Carolina to the South Carolina border. Currently, there are plans to improve the trail so that it can become an officially designated state canoe trail through the North Carolina Division of Parks and Recreation State Trails Program. The 230-mile trail has numerous access points at public recreation areas on the Project reservoirs and includes the entire 38-mile stretch within the Project. Specifically, the Yadkin-Pee Dee River Trail map lists 31 of the inventoried public recreation areas on the Project reservoir's as either providing boat access or providing some other facilities (bathroom, picnic tables, camping). At each public recreation area, a Yadkin-Pee Dee Lake Project River Canoe Trail sign is provided to show that the area is included as part of the trail.

A summary table of public recreation areas included in the trail is included below (Table 3). The table lists the inventoried public recreation areas included in the trail and the facilities it provides according to the Yadkin-Pee Dee River Trail Map. In addition to the public areas, the trail map also lists High Rock Campground and Marina as providing boating access, camping, bathrooms, and picnic tables. Additionally, the trail map lists three sites that are not discussed in the this inventory: the Whip-O-Will Campground, and boating access sites at Cabin Creek (Tuckertown) and off of Beach Road (High Rock).

5.1.2 Tuckertown Reservoir

Located in Rowan, Davidson, Stanly, and Montgomery Counties, Tuckertown Reservoir has 11 major public recreation areas and no commercial recreation areas that provide direct access to the reservoir. Table 4 below is a summary of the major facilities on Tuckertown Reservoir.

Of the 11 recreation areas, six have major facilities and five do not. The six sites with major facilities include High Rock Dam Tailrace Access (Rowan), Bringle Ferry Boat Access, Flat Creek Boat Access Area, Newsome Road Access, Riles Creek Recreation Area, and Highway 49 Boat Access Area. Lick Creek Fishing Pull-off has historically been represented in FERC Form 80 Reports, but is currently considered "closed" and is not listed as a "major facility." On Tuckertown Reservoir, there are a total of 7 boat ramps, 4 boat docks, and 3 picnic areas. Of the major recreation facilities on Tuckertown; 3 boat ramps, 2 boat docks, and 2 picnic areas are located in Rowan County, 2 boat ramps and 1 picnic area are located in Davidson County, and 2 boat ramps and 2 boat docks are located in Stanly County. There are no major recreation facilities on Tuckertown Reservoir in Montgomery County.







5.1.2.11 Tuckertown Road Pull-off Fishing Access

The Tuckertown Road Pull-off Fishing Areas consists of four separate pull-off areas used for bank fishing. The pull-off areas are located directly off of Tuckertown Road in Davidson and Montgomery counties.


The first site (southernmost) has a small, grass pull-off parking area on the same side of Tuckertown Road as the access area. Due to the absence of improved parking the pull-off also has considerable mud and vehicle tracks. Facilities at the site include one metal trash receptacle mounted on two 4 x 4s and several unimproved paths to and along the shoreline. There are no signs, accessible pathways, or vegetation management at this site. The site is also located directly adjacent to a NCWRC Game Lands area.

The second site has a small pull-off parking area on the opposite side of Tuckertown Road as the access point, creating potentially unsafe vehicular/pedestrian interactions. The sites facilities include two trash receptacles (one plastic, one metal) mounted on two 4 x 4s and several unimproved paths to and along the shoreline. There are no signs or vegetation management at this site.

The third site has a U-shaped, gravel pull-off parking area that is in good condition. The site also has one metal trash receptacle and unimproved paths along the shoreline. The footpaths were observed to be muddy. There are no signs, lighting or vegetation management at this site. This site is also located directly adjacent to a NCWRC Game Lands area.

The fourth site (northernmost) has little or no available parking. No parking signs have been posted at an adjacent private driveway. This site has three metal trash receptacles and unimproved shoreline access. Non-motorized boaters could potentially use this site for launching. There are no signs, lighting or vegetation management at this site.


Figure 5-1: Location Map of Tuckertown Road Pull-off Fishing Access Areas.



5.1.2.12 Tuckertown Dam Canoe Portage

The Tuckertown Dam Canoe Portage Trail is located on the east side (Montgomery County) of Tuckertown Dam. The takeout is approximately 100 yards before the dam. From the takeout, the trail follows uneven terrain ascending towards the dam edge. At the dam, the trail then opens up to a wide, grassy trail and follows a fence line. The trail then connects with a gravel powerhouse access road. The road follows two switchbacks to the waterfront at Tuckertown Dam Tailrace Fishing Access. The put-in is along the shoreline at the fishing access. The trail is clearly marked throughout by orange blazes. On the date of the inventory there were no observed maintenance issues, although conditions could potentially change during the growing season. The total trail distance is about one-third of a mile.

5.1.3 Narrows Reservoir (Badin Lake)

Located in Davidson, Stanly, and Montgomery counties, Narrows Reservoir (Badin Lake) has 16 public recreation areas and one commercial recreation area¹ that provide direct access to the reservoir. The Uwharrie National Forest (UNF) also borders the reservoir on the east. The UNF maintains several recreation areas that provide access to Narrows Reservoir (Badin Lake). A summary of the major facilities on Narrows Reservoir is included in Table 5 below.

Fourteen of the 16 public recreation areas have major facilities; the only two areas without major facilities are Tuckertown Dam Tailrace Access Area and the Narrows Dam Canoe Portage. All totaled, there are 10 boat ramps, 7 boat docks, 2 fishing piers, 1 swim area, 3 campgrounds, and 7 picnic areas on Narrows Reservoir (Badin Lake). Individually, 7 boat ramps, 4 boat docks, 1 fishing pier, 3 campgrounds, and 3 picnic areas are located in Montgomery County and 3 boat ramps, 3 boat docks, 1 fishing pier, 1 swim area, and 4 picnic areas are located in Stanly County. There are no public recreation areas on Narrows Reservoir (Badin Lake) located in Davidson County.



Plans to Upgrade, Expand, or Construct New Facilities: USFS has proposed new facilities that include two new vault toilets, a flush toilet, paved parking, water system, electrical power, a host site and three small accessible fishing platforms located along a hardened hiking trail. The project will raze the existing chemical toilets. ¹

Observations of Operations, Maintenance, and Safety Issues: 1) Evidence of significant shoreline erosion. 2) No lighting.



5.1.3.9 UNF Badin Lake Campground

The Badin Lake Campground is located at the end of USFS Road 597A in Montgomery County in the Uwharrie National Forest. The campground is currently being reconstructed and it is anticipated that construction will be completed in the spring of 2005. Because of reconstruction, a complete inventory could not be conducted. The campground has two loops: an Upper Loop and a Lower Loop. Reconstruction of the Upper Loop is nearly finished. It has 13 campsites, including one double site. Each site has a picnic table, a fire ring/grill, two lantern poles and a tent pad. There is also one trash dumpster and a pay station at the Upper Loop.

The Lower Loop is currently under construction and will have 21 sites including two double sites and a host site. Like the Upper Loop, each site at the Lower Loop will include a picnic table, a fire ring/grill, two lantern poles, and a tent pad. It is also planned that at least two of the sites will be fully accessible. There are not or will not be any electrical hookups at any of the sites except the host site. Currently there are two toilets for the entire campsite. Upon completion of reconstruction, these toilets will be replaced with three new bathhouses (toilets and showers) and a new water and septic system. The toilets, hydrants, and trash receptacles will also be accessible upon completion of reconstruction.


A single camping site costs \$8.00 per night and double sites are \$16.00 per night. Reservations can be made by phone or internet but are not required.

The campground is directly adjacent to Narrows Reservoir and provides access to the Badin Lake Hiking Trail (see Section 5.1.3.13). The shoreline in this area is significantly eroded and has nearly removed parts of the trail near the campground. The campground is also included as part of the Yadkin-Pee Dee River Trail.

5.1.3.10 Badin Lake Group Camp

The Badin Lake Group Camp is located off USFS Road 597A in Montgomery County in the Uwharrie National Forest adjacent to the Badin Lake Campground. Developed for use by clubs, families and other groups, the campground has three separate areas each with tables, grills and tent pads. The site inventory also includes 4 water spigots, 2 vault toilets, one trash bin containing four receptacles, an information board, and a well house. Specifically, there is a Site A, Site B, and Site C.

Site A has 5 tent pads, 3 picnic tables, 3 grills, 2 log benches, and 5 lantern poles. None of the facilities at Site A are barrier-free. The ground surface is uneven (rocks, roots, etc.), there are no accessible pathways, the picnic tables and grills are not accessible, and wooden borders prevent access to the tent pads. According to the USFS, the entire site needs to be reconstructed.

Site B has 5 tent pads, 3 picnic tables, 3 grills, 3 log benches, and 5 lantern poles and is also inaccessible due to the same reasons listed for Site A.

Site C has 5 tent pads, 3 picnic tables, 2 grills, 6 log benches, and 4 lantern poles. Except for grill accessibility, the facilities at Site C is inaccessible. Site C needs to be regraded and regraveled.

A \$40.00 fee is charged per site per night. Reservations must be made prior to camping in this area.


Other facilities include four water spigots, one in close proximity to each group site, and one adjacent to the information board. The spigot at Site A is inaccessible, the spigot at Site B has a broken grate and is unable to drain due to an infill of dirt, and the spigot at Site C needs replacement due because it has a broken grate and is non-functioning. The remaining spigot is in good condition. Also available are two vault toilets. The first (near Site A) is in good condition, but lacks an accessible pathway to make it accessible. The second toilet (between Sites B and C) needs a door spring replaced and is missing a door plate. It also lacks an accessible pathway. The well house needs a vent replaced and the trash bin is inaccessible.



5.1.3.12 UNF Cove Boat Landing

The Cove Boat Landing is located at the U.S. Forest Service Road 597B in the Uwharrie National Forest in Montgomery County. This site is owned and maintained by the U.S. Forest Service. The Cove Boat Landing was inventoried with the USFS (David Wright) on November 11, 2003 and February 17, 2004.

The Cove Boat Landing has been closed since September 3, 2003 for renovations and is expected to be completed and reopened in summer 2004. Because of reconstruction a complete inventory could not be conducted. The reconstruction will include a two-unit toilet, a paved 23 vehicle parking lot (with one designated accessible space), and barrier-free paved walkway to a new courtesy dock and single-lane paved launch ramp, a paved access road, an information board, and trash receptacles. Currently, there is a picnic area adjacent to the water-based facilities and it is unclear whether this area will remain upon reopening. The Cove Boat Landing is included as part of the Yadkin-Pee Dee River Trail.

5.1.3.13 UNF Badin Lake Hiking Trail


The Badin Lake Hiking Trail is a 5.6 mile loop trail that follows the Narrows Reservoir shoreline and then continues through the Uwharrie National Forest in Montgomery County. The trail was constructed by the Youth Conservation Corps in 1979 and 1980. The official trailhead is at the Cove Bo at landing but the trail is also accessible from other public recreation areas in the UNF such as Badin Lake Campground, Badin Lake Group Camp and Arrowhead Campground. Starting from Cove Boat Landing, the trail can be shortened to a 2.5-mile loop with approximately 0.75 miles adjacent to the shoreline. The longer 5.6-mile loop runs adjacent to the shoreline for approximately 3.5 miles of the entire distance. The trail can become boggy in several stretches during high water and the trail is also encroached upon in several stretches by erosion. In addition to hiking, the trail is used for shoreline fishing access and primitive camping.




5.1.3.17 Narrows Dam Canoe Portage

The Narrows Dam Canoe Portage Trail is located on the west side (Stanly County) of Narrows Dam. From the takeout, the trail follows a narrow incline for about 300 feet. The trail then follows the gravel dam access road until it reaches the dam (about 200 feet). The trail then ascends; at first it is through a narrow, grassy path and then it reaches an old railroad bed (wide, even terrain) and continues a moderate ascent. The trail then descends through a steep, wide, path covered with leaf litter. The trail then reaches the gravel powerhouse access road and follows it down to the employee parking area. At the parking lot, the trail leads behind a fence (very narrow) and descends to an excellent wide path towards reservoir's edge. At the reservoir, the trail leads across a large concrete foundation (old French powerhouse) to put-in. The trail is clearly marked throughout by orange blazes. The trail is often very narrow, and although there were no maintenance issues on the inventory date, the growing season may create passage problems. Total trail distance is about 0.75 miles.



5.1.4.1 UNF Deep Water Trail Access

The Deep Water Trail Access is located at the end of USFS Road 576 in Montgomery County in the Uwharrie National Forest. The site is owned and maintained by the U.S. Forest service. The Deep Water Trail Access was inventoried with the USFS (David Wright) on February 17, 2004.

To access the site, visitors must park in a small unimproved parking area at the end of USFS 576 and hike down (presumably four-wheel drive vehicles may have vehicular access) a 1,250 feet (approximately 13 feet wide) pathway to the reservoir shoreline. This path is steep and often traverses difficult terrain. At the shoreline, there is a small clearing and an unimproved dirt boat launch approximately 30 feet wide. The site is primarily used for dispersed camping, bank fishing, boat launching, and hiking. On the date of the inventory, several fire rings were also observed. This site is included as part of the Yadkin-Pee Dee River Trail.

Currently, the USFS is considering one of two options for future improvements to this access area. The first is to make road improvements on the access road (such as grading and paving) and to construct hardened campsites. The second is the gate off the access road and create an improved footpath down to the site. Hardening and designating campsites and adding a toilet and other amenities is planned even if public access is restricted to foot traffic (USFS letter dated November 23, 2004).



5.1.4.3 Falls Dam Canoe Portage

The Falls Dam Canoe Portage Trail is on the east side (Montgomery County) of Falls Dam. From the takeout, the trail ascends (steep and rocky) across a narrow, rocky and uneven path alongside the reservoir towards the dam. At the dam, the trail begins a moderate to steep descent along a slightly more even trail. Upon approaching the put-in, the trail becomes very steep and rocky. The ensuing put-in would likely prove difficult to a portaging canoeist. Trail is clearly marked throughout by orange blazes. Although there were no maintenance issued observed on the inventory date, growing season may alter trail conditions. The total trail distance is about one-third of a mile.

5.2 Commercial Recreation Areas

On High Rock and Narrows reservoirs, there are a total of five commercial recreation areas (included in this inventory). Four areas are located on High Rock Reservoir and one is located on Narrows Reservoir. Combined, the five commercial areas provide four marinas including five boat ramps and five boat docks, one fishing pier, one campground, and two picnic areas.

5.2.1 High Rock Marina and Campground

High Rock Lake Marina and Campground is located at 1013 Wafford Circle on the Abbotts Creek Arm of High Rock Reservoir in Davidson County. With 2,000 feet of waterfront, the Marina and Campground's facilities include tent sites, RV hookups, cabins, a boat ramp, a fishing pier, a marina, a snack bar and a variety of other recreational facilities.

High Rock Lake Marina and Campground has 93 total RV sites. Of these 93 sites, 80 have full service hookups and 13 offer water and electric. The site also has 5 tent sites and availability for group camping. The Campground also offers eight rental cabins of several types and sizes. Check-in for campsites is 3:00 p.m. for both tent sites and cabins and checkout time is 2:00 p.m. for tent sites and 12:00 p.m. for cabins. Current camping fees are listed below in Table 8.

With approximately 2,000 feet of shoreline, waterfront facilities include a boat ramp, a fishing pier, a marina and docks for boat rentals. The boat ramp is a single-lane, concrete facility approximately 15 feet wide, the L-shaped fishing pier has a platform approximately 35 feet by 8

feet, and the marina consists of a dock with approximately eight slips. The marina also has additional docking facilities for its numerous pontoon boats and fiberglass fishing boats. Gas and propane are available at the marina. There is no swimming access at High Rock Lake Marina and Campground.

Other amenities provided by the Campground include a swimming pool, a laundry, a basketball court, horseshoe pits, a playground, a pavilion, a recreation field, a store, a game room, and a snack bar. Sanitation facilities include a large bathhouse and two large dump stations. Pay phones are located next to the pool and the bathhouse. The facilities are open throughout the year.

5.2.2 High Rock Boat Dock Marina

High Rock Boat Dock Marina is located at 339 North Shore Drive on the Abbotts Creek arm of High Rock Reservoir in Davidson County. Boat Dock Marina has approximately 300 feet of shoreline and facilities include a multi-slip dock, gas pumps, a private boat ramp, boat rentals, a convenience store, dry boat storage facilities, and a beach club. The marina also offers full service mechanical repair for all types of boats.

The multi-slip dock has tie-offs to accommodate approximately 30 boats and the marina has another smaller dock that keeps rental boats. The dock has two gas pumps available for refueling. A 12 feet by 12 feet floating courtesy dock is also available for patrons of the ships store. Adjacent to the marina is a 40 feet by 12 feet single-lane concrete boat ramp used by the marina to test boats. The boat ramp is not available for public use. The marina's convenience store carries gas, oil, ice, beverages, food items, and fishing supplies. Dry boat storage is available via monthly and annual contracts.

5.2.3 High Rock Boat and Ski Club

The High Rock Boat and Ski Club is located at 2675 Providence Church Road near the Crane Creek Arm of High Rock Reservoir in Rowan County. The Boat and Ski Club is a private club and restaurant only available to members. Membership to the club requires annual membership dues of \$20 and is open year-round. The Boat and Ski Club has approximately 1,500 feet of shoreline and waterfront facilities include a boat dock with approximately 10 slips and private concrete boat ramp. All facilities are available for members only. The restaurant serves dinner nightly and the club offers live music and DJs.



5.2.4 Tamarac Marina

Tamarac Marina is located at 9120 Bringle Ferry Road on the Second Creek arm of High Rock Reservoir in Rowan County. Tamarac Marina has approximately 1,500 feet of shoreline and facilities include a boat launch, boat docks, gas, a restaurant, a general/convenience store and other day-use facilities.

Parking at the marina includes a paved lot at the gas station and a large, gravel auxiliary parking area for boat trailers adjacent to the marina. The marina's waterfront facilities consist of a concrete boat launching ramp approximately 20 feet wide, two floating wooden boat docks with terminals approximately 15 feet by 15 feet, and a large outdoor picnic area with a sheltered pavilion. A boat launching fee of \$1.00 (per day) or \$25.00 (season) are charged.

The convenience store carries snacks, sodas, beer, and fishing and outdoor supplies. Adjacent to the store is a restaurant that carries grill-type fare with an outdoor patio overlooking the reservoir. Within the store/restaurant are men's and women's restrooms.





5.2.5 Lake Forest Campground/Fish Tales Marina

Fish Tales Marina and Lake Forest Campground are located at 700 Lake Forest Drive on the Reynolds Creek arm of Narrows Reservoir in Montgomery County. Fish Tales Marina has approximately 325 feet of shoreline and facilities include parking, a boat dock, a launch ramp, a restaurant, a trailer campground, and other amenities.

Parking for marina facilities includes a small paved lot adjacent to the restaurant and a large grass and gravel parking area adjacent to the campground. The marina has a 10-slip floating wooden boat dock with a sheltered gas pump with an additional pump located in the paved parking area. The boat launch consists of a paved asphalt ramp approximately 20 feet wide. There is a \$2.00 launch fee with an additional charge of \$1.00 for extra vehicles.

The restaurant, Fish Tales Marina Grille, offers breakfast and lunch and also houses a game room and rest rooms. The restaurant is open on weekends only in April through May and mid-August through September and open Thursdays through Mondays from June through mid-August.

The campground is adjacent to the marina and consists of approximately 52-55 trailers (many include constructed wooden additions). Trailer sites are leased at annual rates and are therefore semi-permanent.

5.3 Dispersed Recreation Areas

Dispersed recreation areas were surveyed by boat on all four reservoirs on March 31 and April 1, 2004. Another survey of dispersed recreation areas was conducted on Narrows Reservoir with the USFS earlier in November 2003. Dispersed recreation areas are sites where recreation occurs that are not within the boundaries of an established public recreation area. Specifically, 41 total sites of varying lengths of shoreline were inventoried; 5 on Falls Reservoirs, 12 on Narrows Reservoir (Badin Lake), 12 on Tuckertown Reservoir, and 12 on High Rock Reservoir. For each site, the inventory included location (using GPS), types of activities (predominantly bank fishing and camping) and method of access (either from land or boat).

While this inventory documents specific dispersed areas where recreation is known to occur, it should be noted that dispersed recreation generally occurs (at varying use levels) along the entire shoreline. More specifically, dispersed recreation is pervasive on islands and along forested shorelines that are not directly adjacent to private property. The sites documented in this discussion are considered to be sites where use is most obvious and significant. Also, although it may not always be the predominant method of access, all dispersed recreation areas can be accessed by means of boat. Likewise, although camping may be noted as the predominant activity that occurs at a site, it is assumed that bank fishing occurs at nearly every dispersed recreation site. Yadkin does not allow camping on APGI lands and considers "dispersed camping" as unauthorized. No camping signs have been posted but are frequently vandalized and/or removed. Additionally, many of the sites documented as dispersed recreation are recreation areas that extend beyond the bounds of established public access sites. Although not all such sites will be discussed in this section, it should be noted that at nearly all public access areas, bank fishing extends beyond the established facilities of that recreation site. The specific sites that were inventoried and are discussed below are numbered and shown on Figures 5-6 through 5-9.

5.3.1 Falls Reservoir

Five major dispersed recreation sites were inventoried on Falls Reservoir. Site locations for dispersed recreation on Falls Reservoir are shown on Figure 5-9. A description of the dispersed sites and activities are shown below:


















5.4 Planned and Recently Completed Projects

5.4.1 Eagle Point Nature Preserve – Rowan County

The Eagle Point Nature Preserve is located at the end of Black Road off Bringle Ferry Road on High Rock Reservoir in Rowan County. The preserve falls under the management of Rowan County Parks and Recreation. The preserve consists of approximately 100 acres of public land owned by Rowan County and over 80 acres on lease from Alcoa's Yadkin Division at no cost. The preserve is open daily and hours vary according to the season. Winter hours are from 9:30 am to 4:30 p.m. and summer hours are from 10 a.m. to sunset. The preserve's facilities include hiking trails, a canoe access, and wildlife observation sites.


A narrow gravel road leads from the entrance to a small gravel parking area. At the parking area, there is a portable toilet, two trash receptacles, and an informational kiosk. The kiosk displays a map of the preserve and its notable features. Most notable, is the preserve's network of trails which cover approximately five miles. There are three main trails: the Plant ID Loop Trail, the Goldeneye Cove Trail, and the Point Loop Trail. The trails are wide (5-6 feet) and well maintained. Located along the trails are three vernal pools (one with an interpretive display), three homesites, one upland depression, and two official observation blinds. The Plant ID Loop Trail is an interpretive loop with species signs beside various trees and plants. Certain trail sections run along the lakeshore and provide access to the reservoir for bank fishing. Also along the shoreline are numerous wood duck boxes.

The preserve has a canoe access which is only accessible during high water summer months and requires a 100-yard portage.

5.5 Operations, Maintenance, and Safety at Public Access Recreation Areas

5.5.1 Operations and Maintenance

Yadkin has an ongoing inspection and maintenance program for its public access recreation areas. Each year, Yadkin spends approximately \$500,000 to provide recreational opportunities for the public. Activities include access area maintenance, signage, security, trash/waste collection and disposal. From May 15 through September 15, contractors to Yadkin maintain the Yadkin-managed recreation areas on a weekly basis (at a minimum). Typical maintenance activities include mowing, emptying the trash receptacles, litter clean-up, and other improvements (addition of gravel or sand, maintenance to swim buoy lines etc.) on an observed, as-needed basis. The replacement and repair of trash receptacles and picnic tables are the most common and recurring maintenance activities at the Yadkin Project. Yadkin works with the contractor to replace these facilities as needed. Portable toilets available at some of the recreation areas are also maintained weekly during the recreation season by contractors. Outside of the recreation season, the contractor monitors the recreation areas less frequently. ¹

Yadkin is also responsible for maintaining the four canoe portage trails at the Project. Again, a contractor works to ensure that the trails are maintained and not overgrown, blocked by fallen trees, or washed out. The trails are clearly marked with signs and orange blazes, which Yadkin also maintains. The portage trails are not maintained according to a set schedule but on an as needed basis.

Several of the recreation areas, Dutch Second Creek on High Rock, Flat Creek on Tuckertown, and Circle Drive and Lakemont on Narrows, are cooperatively managed by Yadkin and the NCWRC under a License Agreement. Generally, Yadkin and NCWRC share the cost of maintenance activities such as emptying trash receptacles, mowing, gravel work, and facilities improvements and/or upgrades. The NCWRC maintains these recreation areas on a monthly schedule (collecting trash and vegetation management). This cycle is sometimes altered based on NCWRC needs at other areas. The NCWRC also inspects the condition of the recreation facilities and monitors recreational use (p. communication with Dean Barbee, NCWRC; email dated August 26, 2003).

Sites in the Uwharrie National Forest are maintained by USFS personnel on a weekly basis. Maintenance includes collecting trash, cleaning, and vegetation management. Larger maintenance projects such as construction and facilities improvements may be contracted out.

The Yadkin-managed recreation areas are generally open year-round from dawn until dusk. Swimming areas managed by Yadkin are open during the recreation season only (May 15 –

¹ On July 21, 2004 FERC conducted an inspection of all of Yadkin's public access recreation areas. A report issued by FERC on August 18, 2004 stated, "Free access to the project waters is provided to the public via a multitude of recreational sites. Canoeists can use portages around the dams to continuously traverse the entire project. The licensee employs the services of a contractor to maintain the recreational facilities, and most sites were in excellent condition."

September 15) each year. The recreation areas managed by the NCWRC and USFS are open to the general public throughout the year.

5.5.2 Safety

5.5.2.1 Public Safety Plan

In December 2003, Yadkin filed a revised Public Safety Plan with FERC. Generally, the Public Safety Plan outlines the safety precautions taken at the Project dams and around the Project reservoirs. Such precautions include, but are not limited to, warning signs, "no wake" and "no boat" buoy lines, and lights. FERC regularly inspects these facilities at the Yadkin Project to ensure that they are maintained.¹

5.5.2.2 Swimming Safety

In addition to the Public Safety Plan, Yadkin developed a proactive, multi-part plan to promote swimming safety at all of its swimming areas in June 2001. The plan limits swimming from sunrise to sunset from May 15 through September 15 and requires children under the age of 16 to be supervised by an adult. In an effort to improve public safety, Yadkin, in 2001, restricted the size of the swimming areas and installed a two-line buoy system. The inner buoy line defines the swimming area and the outer buoy line serves to keep boating traffic out of the swimming area. In addition to installing public telephones and posting emergency procedures, Yadkin also provides safety equipment (rescue throw bags) at the swimming areas. Yadkin provides funding to local governments to support additional law enforcement patrols at the recreation areas and local swimming safety programs. In February 2004, Yadkin funded the purchase of a patrol boat for the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office of Water Safety. Yadkin has also provided throw bags to county law enforcement departments to use in their boats.

¹ A report issued by FERC on August 18, 2004 stated, "Fencing, signs, and other safety measures appeared to be in good condition, and all safety measures appeared to be consistent with the Public Safety Plan."



In May 2004, Yadkin, in cooperation with SAFE KIDS in Davidson County, installed a life jacket station to promote water safety at the Buddle Creek Access Area. A similar life jacket station was installed at the Flat Swamp Access Area in 2003. The stations are designed to offer free use of life jackets for children and other inexperienced swimmers. Yadkin has offered to install a similar life jacket rack in cooperation with SAFE KIDS in Rowan County.

5.5.2.3 Public Safety at Project Dams

In 1968, to ensure public safety around dams, "Exclusionary Zones" were established below Tuckertown and Falls dams. These zones, enforced by the NCWRC, prohibit fishing, swimming, and boating within 100 feet up and downstream of the dams. In 2001, Yadkin petitioned the NCWRC to designate similar exclusionary zones at High Rock and Narrows dams, but was denied. In 2003, Yadkin asked the NCWRC to reconsider its previous petition for exclusionary zones at High Rock and Narrows dams. Unsuccessful in its attempts to designate exclusionary zones at these dams, Yadkin posted additional safety signs at all four dams to reinforce the importance of water safety. The signs, posted in English and Spanish, inform individuals that fishing, swimming, and boating within 100 feet of the dams and powerhouses is potentially dangerous and may be prohibited. Yadkin strongly encourages users to take additional caution in these areas.

5.5.2.4 Other Safety Issues¹

There are several areas around the Project reservoirs, especially at bridge crossings, where fishermen like to bank fish. Concerned about the potentially unsafe pedestrian and vehicular interactions along roadways, Yadkin is discouraging this use in some areas. For example, Yadkin, in cooperation with NCDOT, has posted numerous "No Parking" signs along the NC Highway 8 at Abbotts Creek to discourage fishing from the bridge. Additionally, Yadkin provides no facilities (e.g. trash receptacles) at this area. Other fishing pull-offs areas where use has been discouraged through "No Parking" signs and the absence of improved facilities include Crane Creek Fishing Access Pull-off, and Lick Creek Fishing Pull-off. These areas are considered "closed" and will no longer be considered official public recreation areas.

¹ The clearance of bridges over the reservoir at higher reservoir elevations has also been identified as a safety issue. At higher reservoir elevations, the clearance height for boats moving underneath bridge overpasses decreases. Yadkin is currently discussing possible remedies with the North Carolina Department of Transportation and the railroad. It is anticipated that the issue of exposed stumps due to lower reservoir levels will be discussed in the Recreation Use Assessment Report.

6 Conclusions

The recreational facilities at the Yadkin Project are managed responsibly to provide safe, clean, attractive, and accessible recreational facilities. Generally, recreational opportunities and facilities abound at the Yadkin Project, with the sole exception being dispersed recreation opportunities (camping and fishing). A subset of the facilities available at the Project may become inaccessible during a drawdown or drought. APGI, the USFS, and the NCWRC are all very diligent with facility operations, maintenance, and safety. While several of the recreation facilities at the Project have been designed and constructed to provide barrier-free access, in many cases, the facilities are not along an accessible pathway and are not barrier-free.

6.1 Availability of Recreational Opportunities and Facilities

The public access recreation areas inventoried as part of this study provide opportunities for motorized and non-motorized boating, bank and pier fishing, camping, swimming, picnicking, and hiking. Yadkin, the USFS, and the NCWRC work independently and cooperatively to provide and maintain boat launches, courtesy boat docks, fishing piers, swimming areas and beaches, campsites, and hiking trails.

Currently, there are 40 major public recreation areas (excluding areas considered "closed") that provide direct access to Yadkin Project lands and/or waters. These recreation areas are located in Davie, Davidson, Rowan, Montgomery and Stanly counties. Table 9 below contains a summary of all major recreation facilities by county.

With 26 boat ramps, 15 boat docks, and 40 bank fishing areas, boating and fishing facilities are well-dispersed. Generally, the ramps and docks are distributed evenly around the Project with Davidson, Montgomery, Rowan, and Stanly having 7, 7, 5, and 6 boat ramps respectively. Similarly, picnic areas (14 total) are also well-dispersed among the four counties. Fishing piers are available in Montgomery and Stanly counties, swim areas are available in Davidson and Stanly counties, and campgrounds are available in Montgomery County.

As discussed in Section 5.3, dispersed recreation, primarily fishing and camping, is prevalent around the Project reservoirs. The prevalence of dispersed recreation suggests that not all recreation demands are being met by established public recreation areas: primarily camping. Currently, there are only three public campgrounds adjacent to the Project reservoirs and they are all within the Uwharrie National Forest. With the exception of High Rock Marina and Campground (private), there are no camping facilities on High Rock, Tuckertown, and Falls reservoirs.

The operation of each of the Project reservoirs may affect the availability of recreational facilities at any given time. High Rock Reservoir is operated according to an annual operating guide. Under this guide, the reservoir water levels are maintained at a high level from May 15 through September 15 and are then drawn down during the fall and winter. Typically, the drawdown at High Rock is between 12 and 15 feet. Similar to High Rock, Narrows Reservoir has storage capabilities and a maximum drawdown capacity of 30 feet. However, Narrows is typically maintained within 3 feet of normal full pool. Yadkin has the ability to draw down Narrows Reservoir as much as 6.6 feet during periods of very low inflow without requesting a variance from FERC. For these reasons, facilities on High Rock and Narrows may be affected by Project operations. Tuckertown Reservoir has limited storage capacity and is operated with a daily pondage and a normal fluctuation of 0 to 3 feet. Like Tuckertown Reservoir, Falls Reservoir has very limited storage capacity and is operated with a daily pondage and a normal fluctuation of 0 to 3 feet. Because of these operating guidelines, facilities on Tuckertown and Falls are generally unaffected by Project operations. Table 10 below describes the availability of recreational facilities at High Rock and Narrows reservoirs at varying water levels.

Under current Project operations, during the summer months, all boat ramps and facilities on High Rock and Narrows reservoirs remain usable. However, when High Rock Reservoir is drawn down (e.g. seasonally, for maintenance, etc.), some facilities may become unusable. Specifically, the boat ramps at the Buddle Creek Boat Access Area, the Dutch Second Creek Boat Access, and the Flat Swamp Boat Access may be affected by a drawdown. The boat ramp nearest the head of the cove at the Southmont Boat Access may also be affected when High Rock Reservoir is down 5-ft or more because of the shallow water in the cove. All boat ramp facilities on Narrows are generally unaffected by normal reservoir operation, but may become affected during periods of low inflow.

¹ As part of a study being conducted for the Yadkin Project relicensing, Narrows Reservoir was drawn down 15 to 20-ft in December 2003. The availability of many of the recreational facilities on Narrows Reservoir was documented during this time.

6.2 Condition of Recreational Facilities

Generally, the recreational facilities at the Yadkin, USFS, and NCWRC recreation areas are well maintained and in good condition. Recent improvements have been made at several of the recreation areas. New, anti-sway floating boat docks were installed at the Flat Swamp Boat and Swim Access Area, the Buddle Creek Boat Access Area, the Southmont Boat Access Area, and the Old Whitney Boat Access Area in 2001; two new boat docks were installed at the Highway 49 Boat Access Area in winter of 2000-01; the boat ramps at Circle Drive Boat Access Area were extended during the winter of 2000-01; and a new double-lane boat ramp and floating dock were installed at the Dutch Second Creek Boat Access Area in 2003.

Additionally, there are existing plans to improve and/or upgrade the facilities at some of the recreation areas. Specifically, the Cove Boat Landing and Badin Lake Campground in the Uwharrie National Forest are currently undergoing considerable renovations.

While the recreation facilities are generally in good condition, there are a few facilities that are in need of repair or replacement. Specifically, there are boat ramps in need of repair or maintenance, including those at the Newsome Road Access, the Southmont Boat Access Area, the Highway 49 Boat Access Area, the Garr Creek Access Area, the Lakemont Access Area, the Palmerville Access Area, the Highway 601 Boat Access Area, and the Falls Boat Access. Additionally, there are instances of vandalism to trash receptacles, signs, picnic tables, and portable toilets. Also, there are parking areas and access roads where the surfacing is has deteriorated. Such conditions could be remedied with regravelling, regrading, or compaction. Table 11 shows each public recreation area and general notes on their condition.

There are a few specific recreation areas that the condition is generally poor overall. These areas, the Newsome Road Access Area, Holt's Cabin Picnic Area, the Lakemont Access Area, and the Rowan County Pump Station, should either be closed or reconstructed¹.

As discussed in Section 5.5, Yadkin has taken great efforts to improve public safety at its recreation areas. Specifically, Yadkin has recently updated its Public Safety Plan (December 2003), which outlines the specific safety precautions taken at the Project developments. Yadkin has also worked to improve swimming safety at the Project's three swimming areas and beaches through the posting of bi-lingual safety signs, the provision of safety and rescue equipment, and the funding of additional country patrols at these areas.

6.3 Barrier-Free Accessibility

A disabled access assessment was made at each public access recreation area. A "barrier-free" facility is a facility where access is free of impediments to safe use and passage to persons with disabilities or handicaps.² Typical impediments at boating and fishing facilities include the absence of cuts in the curb around parking lots, improperly surfaced walks and decking, poor transitions from pathways to structures such as boat docks and fishing piers, and steeply graded access ways.

The barrier-free assessment of each of the recreation areas was based on criteria described in the United States Access Board's "Accessible Fishing Piers and Platforms" and "Accessible Boating Facilities." The Design Guide for Accessible Outdoor Recreation prepared by an Interagency (US Forest Service and National Park Service) Guidelines Task Group for Accessible Outdoor Recreation recommends that approximately five percent (5%) of recreational areas, such as picnic or campsites be barrier-free.

Any barrier-free facility, such as a boat ramp, courtesy dock, fishing pier, or a picnic area should be designed so that it can be approached, entered, and used by people with disabilities. Factors considered in conducting the disabled access assessment at each recreation area included: the availability of signed handicapped parking; the surface and slope of accessible pathways; access to boat transfer facilities (courtesy docks); the design of existing fishing piers; the accessibility to side or end-approach picnic tables; and the availability of barrier-free restroom facilities at each recreation area. Table 12 below summarizes the barrier-free opportunities at all public recreation

Although limited, barrier-free opportunities do exist at the Project. The Circle Drive Boat Access Area, managed by the NCWRC, is a good example of barrier-free boating facilities. The area has a designated and signed handicapped parking space, which is along an accessible pathway (concrete) that leads to accessible boat ramps and courtesy docks (one with a handicapped accessible handrail). The restroom facilities at this area are not barrier-free.

Several access areas, such as the Highway 49 Boat Access Area on Narrows Reservoir (Badin Lake), are designed to be barrier-free, but lack some necessary elements. The courtesy boat docks at the Highway 49 Boat Access Areas were constructed to be barrier-free, but there is currently no signed handicapped parking space or accessible pathway to the facilities. In most cases, the absence of an accessible pathway and/or a designated parking space are the only remaining improvements required to make facilities barrier-free. Because the predominant uses

Final Study Plan October 2003

Background

Alcoa Power Generating Inc. (APGI) is the licensee for the Yadkin Hydroelectric Project. The Yadkin Project is currently licensed by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) as Project No. 2197. This license expires in 2008 and APGI must file a new license application with FERC on or before April 30, 2006 to continue operation of the Project.

The Yadkin Project consists of four reservoirs, dams, and powerhouses (High Rock, Tuckertown, Narrows, and Falls) located on a 38-mile stretch of the Yadkin River in central North Carolina. The Project generates electricity to support the power needs of Alcoa's Badin Works, to support its other aluminum operations, or is sold on the open market.

As part of the relicensing process, APGI prepared and distributed, in September 2002, an Initial Consultation Document (ICD), which provides a general overview of the Project. Agencies, municipalities, non-governmental organizations and members of the public were given an opportunity to review the ICD and identify information and studies that are needed to address relicensing issues. To further assist in the identification of issues and data/study needs, APGI has formed several Issue Advisory Groups (IAGs) to advise APGI on resource issues throughout the relicensing process. IAGs will also have the opportunity to review and comment on Draft Study Plans. This Final Study Plan has been developed in response to comments on the ICD and through discussions with the Recreation, Aesthetics, and Shoreline Management IAG, to provide additional necessary information for consideration in the relicensing process.

Study Objectives

The objective of this study is to inventory existing public recreation areas that provide direct access to Yadkin Project lands and/or waters. The inventory will describe the available recreation facilities, the condition of the recreation facilities, and identify any operational, maintenance, or safety issues at each recreation area. Additionally, to assess the present adequacies and future accessibility needs for people with disabilities to recreation facilities at public recreation areas, the study will include an assessment of disabled access.

Relationship of Study to Other Recreation Studies

The information collected as part of this facility inventory will be used alone and in combination with other information collected during the Recreation Use Assessment to evaluate the adequacy of existing Project public recreation areas to accommodate current use and future demand.

Methodology

For the purposes of this study, recreation areas to be included in the inventory are those areas that are open for public use that provide direct access to Project lands and/or waters. These recreation areas will be divided into three groups: 1) public recreation areas operated and maintained by Yadkin, state or federal agencies, and/or municipalities; 2) privately owned commercial facilities that are open for public use, and 3) unimproved or informal recreation areas on public or private lands that are routinely used for recreation or access to the Project (see Attachment 1). Long View Associates (LVA) will conduct a detailed facility inventory (to include a disabled access assessment) and facility condition assessment at Yadkin, North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission (NCWRC), and U.S. Forest Service (USFS) public recreation areas at High Rock Reservoir, Tuckertown Reservoir, Narrows Reservoir (Badin Lake), and Falls Reservoir. A less detailed inventory and condition assessment will be conducted at commercial facilities (marinas, campgrounds etc.) and the unimproved or informal public/private dispersed recreation areas (including islands). Shoreline trails and dispersed use areas in the Uwharrie National Forest will be included in the facility inventory and condition assessment, as informal recreation areas. Recreational access for the disabled will generally not be addressed at the private commercial or unimproved/informal recreation areas.

Recreation Facility Inventory

The recreation facilities available at each public recreation area will be inventoried. The inventory will include a review of existing information, consultation with recreation area managers and/or private operators, and field investigations. Yadkin inventoried its public recreation areas in the fall/winter of 2000. This information will be updated by verifying the current facilities and condition of those facilities at each recreation area.

Information will be collected for each of the public recreation areas listed in Attachment 1 using a Facilities Inventory and Condition Form (see Attachment 2). Inventory data and photo documentation will be collected on facilities such as, boat ramps, boat docks, fishing piers, bank fishing areas, picnic tables, camping areas, trail or road access, parking areas, sanitary facilities, and utilities. Any plans to upgrade, expand, or build new facilities will be noted.

Facility Accessibility

LVA will assess the present adequacies and future accessibility needs for people with disabilities to recreation facilities at public recreation areas. The disabled access assessment will focus on identifying major areas of concern related to Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliance. During field investigations, a Recreation Facility Disabled Access Form (see Attachment 3) will be used to evaluate the accessibility of boating ramps and docks, pier and bank fishing facilities, campsites, swimming and picnic areas, trails, and other associated facilities (parking, access pathways, trash receptacles, restrooms etc.) at the Yadkin Project. These evaluations will be based on guidance for barrier-free recreation provided by the ADA itself, the ADA Accessibility Guidelines for Buildings and Facilities; Recreation Facilities and A Summary of Accessibility Guidelines for Recreation Facilities (Architectural and Transportation Barriers Compliance Board, September 2002 and June 2003).

Recreation Facility Condition Assessment

LVA will evaluate the existing physical condition of Project recreation facilities at public recreation areas and identify any ongoing (persistent) operations, maintenance, and/or safety issues and determine consistency with Yadkin Project, NCWRC, and USFS management standards.

Using the Facilities Inventory and Condition Form (Attachment 2), the recreation facilities available at each access area will be rated using specific criteria: (N) Needs replacement (broken or missing components, or non-functional); (R) Needs repair (structural damage or otherwise in obvious disrepair); (M) Needs maintenance (ongoing maintenance issue, primarily cleaning); and (G) Good condition (functional and well-maintained). If a facility is given a rating of "N", "R", or "M", a detailed explanation for the rating will be provided. The age of the facilities, as well as any potentially unsafe conditions and signs of overuse will also be noted.

At recreation areas cooperatively managed with the NCWRC and/or USFS, consideration will be given to the respective management standards of the managing agency. The USFS uses a Meaningful Measures process to inventory the infrastructure, establish standards of quality, estimate costs, and prioritize work at its recreation areas. The USFS will be consulted regarding its Meaningful Measures for the USFS recreation areas included in this study.

Operations, Maintenance, and Safety

The operations and maintenance of each recreation area will be reviewed and any potentially unsafe conditions and signs of overuse will be noted. Yadkin's ongoing inspection and maintenance program for its public recreation areas will be evaluated. During field investigations, any safety or health issues at the recreation areas (e.g. vehicular and pedestrian access and interactions, lighting, sanitation etc.) will be noted. In addition, local law enforcement officials will be consulted to understand any enforcement or safety concerns at the recreation areas. Other concerns, as noted in the Resident and Visitor Use Surveys (collected during the Recreation Use Assessment) will also be noted and discussed.

Reporting

Both a draft and final study report will be prepared. The draft study report will be revised and finalized based on comments on the draft study report received from Yadkin, the Recreation, Aesthetics, and Shoreline Management IAG, and other stakeholders. Generally, the report will list the recreation facilities, describe the conditions of those facilities, summarize disabled access recreation opportunities, and identify any operations, maintenance, or safety issues at each recreation area in Attachment 1. The results of this study and the Recreation Use Assessment will be used to make recommendations for facilities improvements (upgrades or expansion) or new facility construction.

Schedule

This study will take approximately 12 months to complete. Field investigations will begin in September 2003.
